# Essential Dutch Vocabulary

While Dutch is the national language in the Netherlands, most people speak English fluently. However, learning a few basic Dutch phrases can help you integrate better.

# DUTCH

#### **General Etiquette**

- **Greetings:** When you meet someone new, a handshake will do. With friends, it's three kisses on the cheek—starting with the left.
- **Directness:** Dutch folks value honesty and straightforwardness, so feel free to express your opinions clearly and respectfully. This might seem blunt at first, but it's just their way of keeping things clear and transparent.

#### **Social Etiquette**

- Scheduling: Plan your social activities in advance. It's rare to drop by someone's place unannounced, so always call or text before visiting. The Dutch love their agendas and planning ahead.
- **Gift-Giving:** Visiting someone's home? Bring a small gift like chocolates, flowers.
- Dining: Dinner usually starts early around 6 PM and is the main meal of the day. Expect simple dishes like the common AVG (aardappels, vlees, en groente potatoes, meat, and vegetables). When dining out, splitting the bill equally using apps like Tikkie is common.

#### **Dutch Values**

- Tolerance and Openness: The Netherlands is known for its open-minded and tolerant society, including liberal attitudes towards LGBT+ rights and soft drug use. You'll find a welcoming and diverse environment.
- **Cycling:** In the Netherlands, biking isn't just a hobby—it's a daily necessity for nearly everyone. The extensive network of bike paths and bike-friendly infrastructure makes cycling an integral part of Dutch life.



# Housing in the Netherlands



**Overview**: DUWO is the largest student housing provider in Delft, working closely with TU Delft to offer student housing. It's a reliable option, especially for first-year international students.

#### Application:

- When to Apply: Early application is crucial. The application is done through DUWO's website or the university's enrollment page on osiaan.tudelft.nl.
- Rental Periods:
  - BSc Students: 1 year maximum.
  - MSc Students: 2 years maximum.
- Availability: Rooms are limited and allocated based on the tuition payment date.
  Popular buildings include Prof. Schermerhornstraat, Michiel de Ruyterweg, and
  Rotterdamseweg.

Additional Services: DUWO also offers Room.nl, where selection is based on account creation date, making it less suitable for short-term international students.

### 2. Facebook

**Overview**: Facebook is a primary platform for finding housing in Delft. Many students find accommodation through various groups where current tenants post available rooms.

#### Tips for Applying:

- **Personalize Your Message**: Introduce yourself, share your hobbies, and make your message personal and engaging. Stand out among many applicants by being genuine and friendly.
- **Be Persistent**: Keep applying to multiple ads as the housing market in Delft is competitive.



- Look elsewhere: Besides Delft look at other nearby cities to live such as The Hague and Rotterdam
- **Beware of Scams**: Always verify the legitimacy of offers and avoid payments before seeing the property or signing a contract.

#### Process:

- Initial Contact: Reach out via email or direct message to express interest.
- Viewings: If selected, you might be invited to viewings or calls.
- House Openings: Some houses hold "instemmings" where multiple applicants visit the house and introduce themselves.

### **3. Other Housing Platforms**

#### Kamernet.nl:

- **Overview**: Kamernet is a popular platform where many rooms are listed, ranging from independent studios to large student houses.
- **Cost**: For €26, you can respond to unlimited housing ads for 15 days.
  - Tip: Rooms on Kamernet are frequently listed on other platforms like Facebook, so consider checking those to save money.

#### Xior Student Housing:

- Locations:

- **Reviews**: Generally positive, with ratings around 4.1 to 5.0.
- **Facilities**: Typically include furnished rooms with shared or private amenities depending on the building.

#### **Public Transport Overview**

The Netherlands boasts an extensive and efficient public transport network, making it easy to travel within and between cities. The main components include:

- **Trains**: Operated by NS (Nederlandse Spoorwegen), trains are a reliable and popular option for inter-city travel.
  - **Discount Products**: Consider purchasing discount passes like "Dal Voordeel" (offpeak discount) if you travel frequently.
- **Buses**: Connect various neighborhoods and towns, often serving as the first or last leg of your journey.
- **Trams**: Available in larger cities like Amsterdam, Rotterdam, and The Hague, providing convenient city travel.
- **Metro Systems**: Found in Amsterdam and Rotterdam, the metro is ideal for longer distances within the city.

**NS Reisplanner or 9292**: These apps are extremely helpful for planning your journeys by bus, tram, or train.

#### **OV-chipkaart**

The OV-chipkaart is the primary payment method for all public transport in the Netherlands. There are two types:

- **Personal OV-chipkaart**: Ideal for long-term stays. It's linked to your name, allowing for automatic top-ups and access to special discounts.
- Anonymous OV-chipkaart: Suitable for short-term visitors. It can be purchased and used without personal registration.

To use the OV-chipkaart, simply check in at the start of your journey and check out at the end by tapping the card on the designated readers.

#### **Student Travel Product**

As an international student, you may be eligible for the Student Travel Product, which offers free or discounted travel on public transport. You can choose between a weekday or



weekend pass, depending on your travel needs. For additional information on the requirements, please visit <u>DUO's eligibility page</u>.

## Cycling

Cycling is deeply embedded in Dutch culture and is often the most practical mode of transportation for students. Consider:

- **Buying a Bike:** For an affordable second-hand bike, check out apps like Marktplaats or purchase one during the introduction week. Alternatively, you can always visit a bike shop later on.
- **Renting a Bike**: Services like Swapfiets offer monthly rentals with maintenance included, making it easy to get around.
- **Bike-Sharing Services**: OV-fiets is a popular bike-sharing service provided by NS (Dutch Railways). It's available at many train stations, making it ideal for quick commutes.



As a new international student at TU Delft, obtaining a BSN (Burgerservicenummer or Citizen Service Number) is essential for various administrative tasks, such as opening a bank account, registering for health insurance, and more. Visit <u>https://www.delft.nl/en/moving-delft-abroad</u> for more information, here are the steps summarised:

## Step 1: Make an Appointment

- 1. Online Appointment:
  - Use the code provided by TU Delft to book an appointment online with the Delft Registration Office. If you don't have a code, contact TU Delft to obtain one.
  - Location: Delft Registration Office, Stationsplein 1, Delft.
- 1. Phone Appointment:
  - Alternatively, you can call 14015 to schedule your appointment. Note that this number works without an area code, even from mobile phones.

### **Step 2: Gather Required Documents**

Ensure you have all the necessary documents before your appointment. Missing documents can result in the need to reschedule.

- 1. Valid Travel Document:
  - Passport (for all students)
  - o Identity Card (EU/EFTA students only)
- 1. Proof of Address:
  - Rental Agreement or Purchase Agreement.
    - If you are staying with someone, bring a signed Authorisation for Lodging form from the primary resident or owner, along with a copy of their proof of identification and their purchase or rental agreement.
- 1. Additional Documents for First-Time Residents:
  - **Birth Certificate** (recent original, if available)
  - Marriage or Divorce Certificate (recent original, if applicable)
  - **Proof of Deregistration** (if coming from the Caribbean Netherlands).
- 1. Residence Permit:
  - Non-EU Students: Bring a copy of your MVV Visa stamped on the page in your passport. If you do not need an MVV Visa, a print of the confirmation email from TU Delft with the subject 'Residence Permit' is also acceptable.



### **Step 3: Attend Your Appointment**

- 1. **Be On Time**: Arrive at the Delft Registration Office on time. If you are late, you will need to reschedule your appointment.
- Document Verification: During the appointment, your documents will be verified.
  Ensure all documents are in print, as there are no printing facilities at the municipality office. There are printing facilities throughout the TU Delft campus.

#### Step 4: Receive Your BSN

- 1. **Immediate Issuance**: If all your documents are in order, you will receive your BSN immediately during the appointment.
- 2. Written Confirmation: Within 4 weeks, you will receive a written confirmation of your registration, including your BSN.

#### Important Tips

- Plan Ahead: Schedule your appointment as soon as possible to avoid delays.
- **Document Preparation**: Double-check that you have all required documents and copies before your appointment.
- Legalisation of Documents: If your documents are from certain countries, they may need to be legalised or have an apostille stamp. Check the Dutch government's <u>website</u> for more information.



Opening a Dutch bank account is essential for non-EU students studying in the Netherlands. It simplifies financial transactions, helps avoid foreign currency conversion fees, and is often required for various subscriptions and services. Here's a comprehensive guide to help you navigate the process.

#### Why Open a Dutch Bank Account?

- 1. Avoid Foreign Transaction Fees: Using a foreign bank account can incur conversion fees for every purchase.
- 2. Local Payments: Dutch debit cards (Maestro) are widely accepted, whereas foreign cards may not be.
- 3. Health Insurance and Subscriptions: Many services, including health insurance and gym memberships, require a Dutch bank account.
- 4. **Faster Transactions:** Benefit from the iDEAL payment system for quick and easy online payments.

#### **Documents Required**

To open a student bank account in the Netherlands, you will generally need:

- Valid Proof of Identity: Passport or ID card.
- Proof of Dutch Residence: Rental contract or registration with the municipality.
- BSN (Burgerservicenummer): Issued upon registration with the local municipality.
- **Proof of Enrollment:** Confirmation from your Dutch educational institution.



• **Residence Permit:** Required if you are not from the EU.

#### Steps to Open an Account

- 1. Gather Documents: Ensure you have all the necessary documents.
- 2. Choose a Bank: Decide between a traditional bank or an online bank based on your needs.
- 3. Apply Online or In-Person:
  - **Online:** Many banks allow you to open an account via their website or mobile app.
  - **In-Person:** Some banks may require a visit to a branch to verify your identity.
- 1. Verify Identity: Complete any required identity verification steps.
- 2. Receive Account Details: Once approved, you'll receive your account details and debit card.



As an international student in the Netherlands, having a Dutch phone number can significantly ease your daily life.

#### Why Get a Dutch Phone Number?

- Avoid Unexpected Costs: Using a foreign number can incur high roaming charges.
- **Better Reception and Internet:** Local providers offer better network coverage and faster internet speeds.
- **Trustworthiness:** A Dutch number is more trusted for local communications.
- Administrative Ease: Necessary for many local services, including banking, healthcare, and subscriptions.

#### **Types of Plans**

- 1. Prepaid SIM Cards
  - o Ideal for: Short-term stays or infrequent phone use.
  - Features: Pay-as-you-go, no long-term commitment.
  - **Providers:** Lebara, Lycamobile, Vodafone.
- 1. SIM-Only Contracts
  - Ideal for: Long-term stays and regular phone use.
  - Features: Monthly payments, often cheaper than prepaid in the long run.
  - **Providers:** Youfone, Simyo, T-Mobile, Tele2.
- 1. Mobile Phone Contracts
  - Ideal for: Those needing a new phone along with a plan.
  - **Features:** Includes a phone, higher monthly costs, longer contract durations (12-24 months).
  - **Providers:** KPN, Vodafone, Odido (formerly T-Mobile and Tele2).

#### **Required Documents**

To get a Dutch phone number, you'll typically need:

- Valid Proof of Identity: Passport or ID card.
- Proof of Address: Rental agreement or utility bill.
- BSN (Burgerservicenummer): Issued upon registration with the municipality.
- Dutch Bank Account: Required for contract payments.
- **Residence Permit:** If you're a non-EU citizen.



#### Steps to Get a Dutch Phone Number

- 1. **Choose a Plan:** Decide between prepaid, SIM-only, or a mobile phone contract based on your needs.
- 2. Gather Documents: Ensure you have all necessary identification and proof of address.
- 3. Visit a Store or Apply Online: Go to a provider's store or their website to sign up.
- 4. Receive Your SIM Card: You'll get your SIM card either immediately in-store or by mail.
- 5. Activate Your Plan: Follow the provider's instructions to activate your SIM card and start using your new Dutch phone number.

## <u>Hii Delft</u>

**Hii Delft** is an initiative created by students, for students, with help and feedback from psychologists and student counselors. The aim is to support personal development through peer support groups and workshops.

# **TU Delft Psychological Services**

**TU Delft** has several psychologists available to help students. The process to meet them is straightforward:

- Walk-in Hours: For a short conversation, simply show up during walk-in hours.
- **Appointments**: They may advise you to make an appointment for a longer session, which is free of charge and limited to three sessions per student.

## E-Health

**Gezonde Boel** is a platform provided by TU Delft to support your mental and physical health. It includes various help groups, courses, and more.

Biggest events of the year

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#### LEIDS UNIZEI

Celebrates the liberation of Leiden from Spanish rule in 1574. Activities include parades, fireworks, and traditional foods like hutspot (stew).



#### OWEE / IP

#### Date: Mid-August

The introduction week for new students at TU Delft, featuring various social and cultural activities including sports events, parties, and campus tours.



#### SINTERKLAAS ARRIVAL

Date: Mid-November

Marks the arrival of Sinterklaas (Saint Nicholas) in the Netherlands, with parades and festivities leading up to December 5th, when gifts are exchanged.



#### KING'S DAY (KONINGSDAG)

#### Date: April 27

A national holiday celebrating the King's birthday with street markets, music, and parades. Everyone dresses in orange, the national color.



#### CARNIVAL (CARNAVAL)

Date: February/March (dates vary based on Easter)

A festive season with parades, costumes, and parties, particularly popular in the southern regions of the Netherlands.
